There are two magnificent examples right here. The institution hosting today's event is the result of a productive meeting of minds between the historian Jaume Vicens Vives and some, at the time, young and inquisitive entrepreneurs. Sixty years on and the Cercle d'Economia remains a leading light.

Likewise, the minister, Gemma Geis, personifies both a commitment to Catalonia's academic community and the necessary return of the Department of Research and Universities to the Catalan Government's Executive Council.

This book by Dr Sangrà and Dr Gallifa calls on us to persevere with these successful experiences and be brave enough to take on new ones. Experiences, not words. It's difficult to predict the future of universities, but experience must play a part.

The challenges, opportunities and proposals covered in the book call on us all... both in the university system in general and in government administrations or private institutions that are committed to digital transformation.

And I'll end with a threefold recommendation: As a publisher, buy the book. As a university president, read the book. And as a member of society, let's talk about the book. Our future depends on it!
